Men's Invitational

Match play events are a true golf challenge and have decided some of golf's most historical championships. The PGA Championship was exclusively a match play event until 1958 and the U.S. Amateur still uses match play to determine its winner. The LedgeStone Men's Invitational should receive excellent exposure through the Ozarks and will give players a great chance to showcase their talents. **This will be the first tournament in the Southwest Missouri/ Northwest Arkansas area of this kind and should draw some of the area's finest players.**

Tournament Field

LedgeStone's Match Play Invitational field will consist of amateur teams from all over the Ozarks including Northeast Oklahoma, Northwest Arkansas, Southeast Kansas and Southwest Missouri. This year all players are invited to play and must carry a USGA handicap.

Format

This is a four-ball match play event with matches lasting through the weekend. First round/qualifying round will start Friday (Tee Times Starting at 11:00) and determine seeding and flights for the weekend matches. Matches will continue through the weekend with Saturday morning matches beginning at 7:30 a.m. tee times and Saturday afternoon matches starting at approximately 1:00 p.m. tee times. **Championship Sunday** will have semi-final matches beginning again at 8:00 a.m. tee times with the Finals starting at 1:30 p.m. All men age 54 and under will play the BLUE tees and men 55 and over will play the WHITE tees. The event will be flighted regardless of the amount of teams entered. All players are guaranteed one round Friday and two rounds on Saturday.

Date and Cost

LedgeStone will be hosting this event from **July 25th through July 27th (\$450 per team /\$225.00 per person). Annual dues paying members pay only \$150.00 per person.** Practice round tee times can be made up to two weeks in advance and cost is our member rate \$49.00. Each player will receive \$100.00 in his choice of Callaway golf equipment or apparel as well as a tee gift valued at over \$50.00

Assistance from the Assistant

This past month brought more rain and wind. With bad weather comes bad scores, but the most common complaint was about the dreaded Three-Putt. It feels so good to get on the green in regulation, and feels so awful when you follow up that performance with a Three-Putt, Bogey. Here are a few things to consider when you have your next Three-Putt.

The Three-Putt is a result of poor distance control. If you stroke your first putt and have perfect distance control, it doesn't matter if you miss the hole 2 feet to the left, because you are only 2 feet away from the hole. Your chance of missing a 2 foot putt is pretty slim, which helps eliminate the Three-Putt from ever happening.

Distance control is just as important as the direction you swing the Putter. To gain better distance control, watch how much the putter swings thru after making contact with the ball. If your putter doesn't swing the same amount after impact, as it does before impact, your putter is not swinging at the same pace throughout the swing. This causes inaccurate distance control, which leads to more 5 and 6 foot putts for Par instead of being in close for gimmie.

Beyond the Gate

If you leave StoneBridge Village by way of the west gate and travel Highway 13 as it winds over Table Rock Lake and through the Ozark Mountains to Highway 86 you'll discover a little country road in Lampe, MO by the name of Boys Ranch Road. At the end of that road is a unique place known as Lives Under Construction Boys Ranch.

Founded in 1982 by Ken and Sheila Ortman, the LUC Ranch began with a vision to make it possible for troubled boys to have a second chance at life by changing their behavior patterns. The Ortman's belief that each person is created with a purpose, that each boy who comes to the Ranch is worth saving and that they can develop to their full God-given potential has been much of the driving force that has kept the Ranch going and growing through these last 26 years. Two basic principles have guided the accomplishments at LUC; first, God can change lives in miraculous ways and second, good work habits are important to building character, self-esteem and self-discipline.

Most of the boys arrive at the Ranch against their will, by way of probation officers, juvenile authorities, or desperate parents. But nearly 200 at-risk boys from 20 states have completed the 15 – 18 month residential treatment program and graduated to reenter the mainstream of life with the values, character and drive to live productive, successful lives. The Ortman's attribute the over 92% success rate to the strong emphasis on Christian values, education, skills training and counseling.

While at LUC the boys attend Blue Eye schools, but many of the boys come to the Ranch seriously behind academically and with needs greater than can be met in the average classroom.

With the help of volunteers they are building an academic center for the boys, where they can receive the additional help and tutoring needed to succeed in school. Many of the boys have, with the help and encouragement of the staff, excelled and become honor students and academic leaders.

In addition to the classroom, the emphasis on work ethic and hands-on skills training opens the door to building self-worth and finding success. Trades such as mechanics, carpentry, animal care, lawn care and landscaping, cooking and housekeeping, and welding are opportunities for the boys to learn real life skills and find their strengths. Boys learn the basics of vehicle maintenance and car repair; proper techniques and safety in using power equipment; how to prepare meals; the value of doing your best; honest work for an honest wage; and how to work with others.

The vision of the Ortman's has grown amazingly over the past 25+ years, but it's not finished. As long as there is one more at-risk young man, then there is one more life to change. It's an amazing place, but the small staff with big hearts can't and don't do it by themselves. Over the years countless volunteers have helped build buildings, teach boys how to make beds and milk cows, demonstrated what it means to be men and women of character and even shown them how to have fun...the right way. The need for men and women who care about seeing boys grow into men of good character is still there. LUC Ranch needs **Volunteers** who have skills they can teach the boys; LUC **Ambassadors** who learn of the program and share it with others to get them involved; and **Auxiliary** members who will commit their time and talent to fund-raising projects. Better yet, take an afternoon and take a drive across the lake, through the Ozark Mountains to a place where lives change, beyond the gate.

FINANCE COMMITTEE'S REPORT

The financial results through April are impressive, especially considering lower than planned golf revenue because of our unseasonably bad weather and slower real estate activity, which directly impact our assessment revenue, ACC permit fees and the road impact fees. Our net Revenue for the four months, after interest expense, was \$90,000. The budget for the four months was \$16,000. So, we are better than our budget by \$74,000. This favorable variance is due primarily to be the following departments operating below their expense budgets: 1) pro shop, 2) golf course maintenance, 3) common area maintenance, and 4) administration. Detailed financial statements are available in the POA office and at the monthly POA Board meetings.

LEDGESTONE GRILLE & NICOL'S FINE DINING

As I am writing this column we just finished the Gridiron Golf weekend, and what a great time it was. It is a rare opportunity to rub elbows with these professional athletes and coaches. My hat is off to Bill Hasler for putting together such an event.

May was a pretty good month restaurant wise, and June looks promising as well. We have several groups in Jun, which really helps our business. I am hoping the new banquet facility is

completed soon. It will be more convenient for all of us to have a separate area for the banquet business.

It's recipe time. I thought a BBQ recipe for this time of year would be appropriate.

Paprika Pork (serves four)

This recipe calls for pork tenderloin but is also good with chops.

- 1 1/2 lbs pork tenderloins (approx)
- 1 1/2 tablespoons paprika, your own choice, sweet, hot or smoked
- 1 teaspoon grated lemons, zest of or lime zest (optional)
- 1 teaspoon dried thyme
- 1 teaspoon dried oregano
- 1 clove garlic, crushed
- 1-2 teaspoon salt
- fresh ground pepper
- 1 1/2 tablespoons olive oil
- lemon slices, to serve

1. Mix all the spices with the olive oil, you should get a thick paste.
2. Rub this on the pork, put the pork in a plastic bag and marinate in the fridge, minimal 4 hours but preferably overnight.
3. To be on the safe side, put the pork in the bag in a dish, once my bag leaked and the fridge was orange!
4. Remove from the fridge 30 minutes before cooking, there will be juices now in the bag, you can use them for basting if you want.
5. Pre-heat your grill and cook 7 to 8 minutes on each side, longer if you want the pork more well done, it will also depend on the thickness of the pork.
6. Cut in diagonal slices and serve with the lemon.
